## DR. JENNIFER DENETDALE

Indigenous Gender Politics of Care in the Time of Covid

Jennifer Nez Denetdale is a citizen of the Navajo Nation. She is professor of American Studies and a historian. She is the author of *Reclaiming Dine' History: The Legacies of Navajo Chief Manuelito and Juanita* (University of Arizona Press), two Navajo histories for young adults and numerous articles and essays. She is the chair of the Navajo Nation Human Rights Commission.



## DR. RAWIRI TAONUI

Māori - Independent Writer, Researcher and Advisor

Dr. Rawiri Taonui is an independent writer, researcher and advisor on Māori, indigenous and inter-cultural human rights, equity, diversity and anti-racism. Rawiri has over 700 columns, articles and features and given over 900 interviews, and has won 9 writing awards. Rawiri represented Massey University at the UN Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues and at the UN Experts Mechanism on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.



## SENATOR MARY JANE MCCALLUM

Barren Lands First Nation - Senate of Canada

Mary Jane McCallum is a Cree woman from the Barren Lands First Nation in Brochet, Manitoba. Mary Jane has spent most of the past 48 years providing dental services and treatment to First Nations as a dental nurse, dental therapist and dentist. She was appointed to the Senate of Canada in 2017.
